<u>Misinformation, disinformation and finding trusted</u> <u>information – resources for the public</u>

- The <u>World Health Organization (WHO)</u> provides tips for spotting misinformation and disinformation
- The <u>PIF TICK</u> website has one-page posters which are free to view and download on topics including false health information warning signs and what to look for in trusted health information
- <u>Independent Age</u> offers advice on managing your health online: independentage.org/get-advice/health-and-care/living-long-term-health-conditions/how-to-find-reliable-health
- The <u>Patient Information Forum</u> has a series of videos to help the public spot misinformation
- The WHO Kahoot! Quiz aims to help people identify the red flags of misinformation
- The <u>Patients' Association</u> has put together a Jargon Buster to help you figure out what some of those complicated medical terms actually mean
- The <u>NHS</u> also has a handy list of abbreviations that you might find in your medical records

- The **NHS** has a Health Literacy Toolkit with information on health and digital literacy and practical tips
- The <u>National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR)</u> evidence collection on health literacy makes the case for improving patient information. It also includes tips on how to make sure everyone can understand the information they are given
